Culture and the arts enrich individuals and bind society together. Culture shows who we are, where we come from and what we stand for. Cultural partnerships and exchanges with foreign countries provide inspiration, increase our store of knowledge and give access to high-quality culture and arts. Internationalization can also promote the development of talent. Exhibitions, performances and translations can help Dutch artists and art institutions reach a wider audience. In these times of crisis related to the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, art and culture have shown the potential of creativity and resilience: quickly adapting cultural productions to digital or hybrid formats combining online with physical activities. And culture is 'soft power'. Through culture, a country strengthens its ability to make friends and wield influence. In a world of increasing international contacts and conflicts. culture can contribute to positive images of the Netherlands and foster debate.

Economically speaking, too, culture is significant. In the Netherlands, the cultural and creative sectors do much to boost employment. Culture is a major element of state visits and trade missions. By crossing borders, artists and art institutions are able to reach new and different audiences, as well as new markets. Making their mark abroad for the first time often helps artists' careers take off. In addition,

international cultural policy is beneficial for the Netherlands' image abroad. We seek to present ourselves as an open and creative country, a country that is appealing as a partner.

This image is also important for other sectors – like tourism – and strengthens our international relations.

In short, government involvement in international cultural policy is necessary: not just because of the intrinsic value of culture, but also because of its international character, its role in the development of talent and its importance for the Netherlands' image as a creative, open country.

In recent decades, international cultural policy has contributed to the internationalization of Dutch culture. It has proved its worth as a pillar of the Kingdom's diplomacy, and it functions as a unifying link between political, economic and social topics in cultural and foreign policy. Responsibility for the Netherlands' international cultural policy is jointly shared by the Minister of Foreign Affairs (BZ), the Minister for Foreign Trade and Development Cooperation (BHOS) and the Minister of Education, Culture and Science (OCW).

Introduction

One of the main goals of the international cultural policy 2021-2024 is cultural diplomacy. In bilateral relations with other countries, culture strengthens the Netherlands' image and provides opportunities to promote mutual understanding and trust. Moreover, cultural diplomacy has great value for foreign policy in general and supports implementing the Dutch international policy (HGIS) goals.

In cultural diplomacy, Dutch cultural expression is valued to support bilateral relationships with other countries. This will help to: • strengthen the Netherlands' position and reputation abroad; • foster dialogue about standards and values; • promote partnerships; • contribute to exchanges and dialogue, even with countries with which the Netherlands may have a complex relationship. The embassies' diplomatic work plays an essential role in this connection, as a transitional force between the global political system and the world of art and culture.

9 HGIS Policy Goals

The HGIS combines the foreign policy budgets of individual ministries. This promotes cooperation and coordination between the ministries concerned. It therefore forms an important instrument in helping achieve an integrated and coherent foreign policy. The Minister of Foreign Affairs coordinates Dutch foreign policy and, thus, the HGIS. The Minister for Foreign Trade and Development Cooperation has the authority to coordinate official development assistance (ODA) spending within the HGIS.

Next

Strengthening the international legal order, promoting respect for human rights and host country policy:

Promoting a well-functioning international legal order, including host country policy, with ongoing focus on human rights as an integral part of foreign policy. A strong legal order and respect for human rights will make the world more stable, safer, freer and more prosperous. This requires well-functioning international institutions and organisations with a broad support base which are committed to fighting impunity.

Peace, security and stability:

Peace, security and sustainable development by preventing and reducing violent conflicts, and promoting the development of the rule of law, peacebuilding and legitimate state structures. Promoting migration partnerships, improving the prospects of refugees and host communities (with a focus on education and employment), and providing emergency aid to alleviate humanitarian emergencies worldwide.

Effective European cooperation:

Effective European cooperation to take the European Union and its member states forward in as peaceful, prosperous and strong a condition as possible. Europe is essential for our prosperity, freedom and security. The Netherlands' active approach to bilateral relationships with European partners is in the direct interests of Dutch citizens and businesses.

Consular services and promoting Dutch values and interests internationally:

Providing high-quality consular services to
Dutch nationals requiring assistance abroad.
Strengthening the Dutch cultural sector through international exchange and presentation; establishing connections with other integrated foreign policy priorities.

Sustainable economic development, trade and investment:

Reducing poverty and social inequality, and promoting sustainable inclusive growth worldwide. The Netherlands is developing a sustainable trade and investment system, including corporate social responsibility (CSR).

Sustainable development, food security, water and climate:

Increased food security; improved water management, drinking water, sanitation and information on hygiene; increased resilience against climate change and tackling climate change; sustainable use of natural resources.

Social progress (including education):

Human development and promoting social equality and inclusive development, including sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) for all and halting the spread of HIV/AIDS. Promoting gender equality and women's rights. Strengthening education; improving young people's opportunities and prospects, increasing the number of well-educated professionals, strengthening higher educational and professional educational institutions. Promoting and protecting the political space for civil society organisations that contribute to strengthening civil society.

9 HGIS Policy Goals

Strengthening development frameworks:

Multilateral cooperation and inclusive growth through strengthened multilateral involvement; using culture and sport in developing countries to help achieve a socially inclusive society that offers opportunities, and promoting social involvement in the Netherlands.

The bilateral dimension:

Specific aspects of the bilateral relation with a political relevance for the Netherlands. For example historic ties, Dutch diaspora and specific, politically sensitive issues.

It therefore forms an important instrument in helping achieve an integrated and coherent foreign policy. The Minister of Foreign Affairs coordinates Dutch foreign policy and, thus, the HGIS. Tips & Tricks

- Cultural Diplomacy: In bilateral relations with other countries, use culture to strengthen the image of the Netherlands and create opportunities to promote mutual understanding and trust – especially in countries with which the Netherlands has a complex relationship.
- Support the HGIS goals: Link your cultural activities to the policy objectives in your annual plan. And, of course, get your relevant embassy colleagues involved as well to make it a common effort and sustainable.
- Network: Develop a broad cultural network on a local basis.
- Cultural organisations: Reflect on whether there are organisations you could collaborate with.
- Cultural disciplines: Think about popular cultural traditions that you may be able to use.
- Local highlights: Stay alert and pay attention to local highlights and use them and their publicity.
- Spin-off: When possible, try to create a spin-off to an existing festival and broaden the audience.

- Online open call: A great way to get to know your potential future partners and an opportunity to work with projects both online and offline.
- King's Day: When King's Day is celebrated at an external location, try to find a cultural venue.
- Cultural value: Add value by putting Dutch partners in touch with local contacts.
- Local objective: Whenever possible, have Dutch arts and culture support a local objective.
- Social criticism: Stage activities at locations which allow for social criticism.
- Film festival: Organise debates around the topics of well-known film festivals.
- Dutch companies: Get Dutch companies involved with your activities.
- Awards: Giving awards for certain activities can contribute in a positive way.
- Target group: Keep in touch with your target group on a regular basis. Social media is a great way to do this.

EMO Girl at the Cloud Festival

During the third edition of the Cloud Festival, the Dutch Embassy in Tirana supported the performance EMO Girl, an emo pop musical directed by the Dutch/Kosovar artist Astrit Ismaili. The performance by a group of femme, queer and non-binary bodies showed us heteronormative ways of how we perceive relationships, gender and sexuality by proposing a new cult-like community. This artistic work was inspired by the Emo-Goth/Rock subcultures that were very present in the early years of 2000. The emo music movements are generally associated with youth who are dispirited and angry at society, people or themselves. Performing pain or dark emotions often creates a distance, which can help in regeneration and healing. EMO Girl is a coping mechanism for complex emotions presented through melodies, lyrics and choreographies.

The Cloud Festival welcomed people from different communities and genres, promoting culture as a universal unifying platform for cooperation and



understanding. After the performance, a discussion and a party were organised at the garden with artists, art-lovers and LGBTI communities. (2019)

Havana - Cuba

AnThropical at the Havana Art Biennial

The Dutch Embassy in Havana has contributed to several projects featured in the 13th Havana Biennal, among which AnThropical. AnThropical is a concept created by Aruban artist Alydia Wever, who invited three Aruban visual artists, three Aruban dancers and one Dutch costume designer to perform at the Biennial. The work consisted of four art installations and a video-art projection, which reflected on the relationship between Aruba, the Kingdom of the Netherlands and Europe. The project's goal was to explore cultural roots and to (re)connect with the Caribbean spirit. (2019)

#breakthesilence

16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence is an international campaign held every year starting on 25 November, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women and runs until 10 December, Human Rights Day.

The Dutch Embassy in Amman, in partnership with local arts platform Artmejo, launched the campaign #breakthesilence. The campaign was an opportunity for local artists and writers to share their feelings, thoughts and experiences with the issue of eliminating violence in all of its forms that prevent women from accessing economic opportunities and independence. Over 70 artistic submissions and 5 written submissions were received.

The Embassy's campaign was launched a few days after the controversial eye-gouging of a woman by her husband in Jerrash, resulting in nation-wide protests. The campaign was able to draw attention to the issue of gender-based violence and create a dialogue amongst Jordanians, with many submissions being shared widely on social media platforms.



The winning submission by artists Miramar Mohammad and Dalal Mitwally – chosen by an independent panel – got the chance to draw their work on an eight-storey mural in the heart of the city, while other were highlighted online by the Embassy and Artmejo. The mural depicts the image of an empowered and strong woman with her chin raised proudly towards the sky, and the words "Let your eyes be cast on the mountaintops" written in red. The verse was taken from

the winning written poem by the young Jordanian poet Seba Al Abbadi. (2019)

Embrace Me

The photo exhibition Embrace Me, displayed in the Europe House in the centre of Pristina, shed a light on the lives of people with disabilities. Dutch photographer Karen Brongers initiated the project, cooperating with local organisations for people with disabilities.

In Kosovo people with disabilities are hardly visible in society. They live a life mostly far from the public eye in institutions or at home. With their appearance, with their portraits, the portrayed people showed that they have all the reasons to be here, to be part of this society as much as anyone else. Embrace Me made them visible.

The Dutch Embassy in Pristina not only financially contributed to the exhibition, but also helped Brongers in setting up her cooperation with local organisations. The support is part of the Embassy's aim to work on a more inclusive and pluralistic society. Ambassador Willems gave her opening remarks stating that people with disabilities deserve to be seen in society, and



commented on how the portraits of the people show their daily lives: their strength and positivity as well as their struggle and vulnerability. (2019)

Medellín - Colombia

Dutch days at the FilarMed

The Orquesta Filarmónica de Medellín (FilarMed), is the professional philharmonic orchestra of the city of Medellin. It organises an academic youth programme aimed at the professional development of young musicians. Participation is free for its ninety beneficiaries from mostly vulnerable backgrounds.

Liviu Prunaru, concertmaster of the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra and Conrad van Alphen, chief conductor of Sinfonia Rotterdam, performed two concerts and lead two master-classes at FilarMed. The group of young musicians played with both Prunaru and Van Alphen at the Pablo Tobón theatre in Medellín.

Next to promoting the Dutch music sector in the region of Antioquia, the project also contributed to the broader goal of supporting the peace process in the country. Medellín in particular has suffered for decades from drug-related violence



and armed conflict, but nowadays forms a good example of social transformation. The project supports this transformation by offering young people the opportunity of a life away from violence, letting them draw inspiration from international artists instead. (2019)

Sofia - Bulgaria

High Literature from the Lowlands

The National Palace of Culture in Sofia was the setting for High Literature from the Lowlands, two consecutive literature events addressing the Bulgarian public. The first one was aimed at Bulgarian publishers who had expressed interest in publishing Dutch authors. Various publishing houses received first-hand information from Barbara den Ouden (Dutch Foundation for Literature) on the foundation's programmes and subsidies. The presentation was followed by a Q&A and one-to-one conversations.

The second event was focused on the general audience. Famous Bulgarian actors and actresses read selected excerpts from 8 Dutch books, translated and for sale in Bulgaria - Het Achterhuis (Anne Frank), Sonny Boy (Annejet van der Zijl), Amsterdam Blues (Arnon Grunberg), Komt een vrouw bij de dokter (Kluun), Bonita Avenue (Peter Buwalda), The Secret Diary of Hendrik Groen, 83 1/4 Years Old, Zomerhuis met zwembad (Herman Koch), The Book of everything (Guus



Kuijer), Een Man In De Tuin (Rutger Kopland). During the event the attentive audience had the opportunity to talk to the artists and purchase books. (2019)

Bratislava - Slovakia

Women's Rights = Human Rights

Every year on the occasion of the international Human Rights Day, the Dutch Embassy in Bratislava joins the UN campaign to reaffirm our commitment to protecting and defending human rights, together with Slovak partners. We decided to highlight women's rights and equality and contributed to a constructive debate. In doing so, we also followed up on the UN's Orange the World Campaign and the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, to raise awareness about violence against women and girls.

Together with 11 like-minded embassies, the European Commission representation, and the Public Defender of Rights, the Embassy expressed solidarity with Orange the World via a coordinated social media campaign.

The Women's Rights = Human Rights activity consisted of a temporary outdoor art installation by a young female designer in the centre of Bratislava



held under the auspices of the Mayor of Bratislava and in partnership with the City of Bratislava. Short personal stories, raising awareness on situations of gender inequality as experienced by real women around the world, were installed in lit objects on trees. These visually pleasant lanterns made a large number of passers-by engage with the subject. Furthermore, a panel discussion on good practices and strategies to promote women's rights and push towards equality at all

levels was organised, with representatives of the Ministry of Justice of the Slovak Republic, City of Bratislava, and NGOs, including a virtual guest from the Dutch gender platform WO=MEN. The Ambassador opened the exhibition before the debate, together with the Vice Mayor. (2019)

Ngaren, the Museum of Humankind

With help from the Dutch Embassy in Nairobi, the world-renowned Kenyan paleoanthropologist and conservationist Richard Leaky was introduced to the director of Naturalis Leiden, Edwin van Huis, in order to support Leaky's plan to realise the research/museum/conservation initiative Ngaren. Ngaren, the Museum of Humankind will be unique for Africa and will foster understanding, providing an unprecedented educational and scientific experience looking at the history of mankind, of migration and the effects of climate change on evolution. It will also be a regional hub promoting access to education and information about sustainability, corporate social responsibility and the importance of the sustainable development goals. The facility will create employment opportunities with a special focus on youth.

In many aspects of the development of Ngaren there is room for involvement of Dutch expertise. Financed through cultural diplomacy funding, Naturalis Leiden was interested to come on a



scoping mission to Nairobi. Leaky and Naturalis have worked on setting up the business and investment plan and the initiative has gained much traction. This resulted in approval to further build on the cooperation by financing a feasibility study for the development of the facility, which is to be carried out by the Dutch company Rebel Group. The study is an important part of the overall masterplan that is currently being finalised by Naturalis and the Ngaren team. (2019)

Holon - Israel

State of Extremes

The exhibition State of Extremes at the Design Museum Holon examined the mechanisms behind processes of radicalisation, in society and in nature, and the role of design and designers in resisting these, assisting them, reflecting on and offering solutions for them. More than 17 designers from the Netherlands and Israeli designers who have studied in the Netherlands participated in the exhibition, forming about a third of presenters.

The exhibition was divided into four sections. Polarisation looked at opposing viewpoints in our society, while Spiralling showed how continuously worsening extremes create a spiralling effect. Extreme Lab presented technological developments that bring design to a new scientific and ethical frontier, and lastly The New Normal showed how what was recently considered extreme can gradually or suddenly be perceived and experienced as normal. Coincidentally, the contents of the exhibition proved very relevant to the COVID-19 pandemic, even though it was held before the world knew about the existence of the virus.



Virtually all works by Dutch designers deal with the SDG's – climate action, responsible consumption and production, reduced inequalities, industry, innovation and infrastructure, decent work and growth and more. In supporting the exhibition, with its clear and strong Dutch component, the Dutch Embassy in Israel helped bring these issues to the fore and at the same time position the Netherlands as a forerunner in these areas through its leading role in design. Lagos - Nigeria

Fashion masterclasses

In honour of the visit of Prime Minister Rutte to Nigeria the Dutch Consulate-General in Lagos organised a fashion show. Previous to the show masterclasses by Dutch designer Mattijs van Bergen were held for Nigerian designers at the Heineken Huis. The participating designers were asked to link their work to A Case of Love, a letter consisting of poems and photos made by Dutch artists. The materials for the masterclasses were donated by Vlisco, and Heineken contributed financially and offered a location for the project. The outcomes of the masterclasses have been showcased during Lagos Fashion Week and the winners of the fashion show will come to Amsterdam Fashion Week to present their beautiful designs. (2019)

Edible Futures

The Dutch diplomatic network in Canada (Ottawa, Vancouver, Toronto) organised the exhibition Edible Futures, a series of thought-provoking art installations that invite visitors to reflect on our shared food future. Presenting multiple perspectives on global food security issues such as climate change, declining fresh water supply, loss of biodiversity, food waste, and the gap between producers and consumers, Edible Futures asks visitors to imagine what the future of food will look like, and what role each of us might play in changing it.

The travelling exhibition was curated by the Dutch Institute of Food & Design and presented by the Dutch Embassy in Ottawa, with support from the Canada Agriculture and Food Museum and the Interior Design Show. For a 5-month period the exhibition was shown in Ottawa, Vancouver and Toronto, attracting more than 60.000 visitors. (2019-2020)



Tehran - Iran

Online Cultural Challenge: TEDxTehran Countdown

The Dutch Embassy in Tehran launched an 'Online Cultural Challenge' in May 2020. Three winning proposals were selected: an online intercultural theatre play about Iranian and Dutch (mis) perceptions of the other; an Iranian/Dutch music project with online performances of traditional Dutch songs performed by Iranian artists and vice versa; and partnership with two online TEDxTehran events about climate change (TEDxTehran Countdown) and female empowerment (TEDxTehranWomen).

The independently-organised event TEDxTehran Countdown, was a part of TED's global launch to the Countdown campaign. The TEDxTehran Countdown, brought together 600 Iranian students, academics, entrepreneurs, and consultants working on innovative and smart solutions for climate change. In his opening speech, the Dutch ambassador emphasised that the Netherlands is keen to collaborate with Iranian partners to raise



awareness, exchange knowledge and expertise, and identify projects and business ideas regarding climate adaptation.

During the event, the audience was treated to an inspiring TEDxAmsterdam talk of entrepreneur Marjan van Aubel on 'The beautiful future of solar power'. Her talk and work on solar design combines Dutch design, sustainability, technology and female entrepreneurship. Furthermore, the Dutch Special Envoy for Water, Henk Ovink, discussed

Dutch water management, and Ursula von der Leyen presented Europe's plan to become the first carbon-neutral continent on earth.

The Online Cultural Challenge planted the seeds for a long-term collaboration between the Embassy and TEDxTehran, providing a platform for fruitful discussions and engagement with a large Iranian audience. (2020)

Lizette Schaap at the International

The International Photography Festival organised by PHOTO IS:RAEL is the biggest photography event in Israel. The Dutch Embassy in Israel collaborated with the non-profit organisation for the first time and made possible an exhibition by the Dutch photographer Lizette Schaap.

Photography Festival

Ten works by Schaap were displayed, with the title Searching for Balance. The Vanish series addressed the dire state of corals which are losing their vitality as sea temperatures rise. the connection between natural processes and our bodies was explored in the series Sleepless – I See the Sky With My Eyes Closed, and works from the series Seafood visualised the damaging effects of micro-plastics on sea-life and thus on the health of the global food-chain.

Thanks to the generosity of the artist and the organisation, the Embassy is now in possession of the printed works and may display them publicly,



as was the case in a networking event during the visit of Minister Sigrid Kaag. (2019)

Several cities -Colombia

Presentations of Curação author Roland Colastica

Roland Colastica is an artist from Curaçao. He writes, plays and tells stories both for children and adults. For his achievements in theatre, Roland Colastica was honoured in 2006 with the prestigious Cola Debrot Award. In 2010, he received the decoration of the Knight of the Order of Orange-Nassau.

Colastica was invited by his Colombian publishing house to perform a tour around five cities in Colombia. He promoted his book Estallidos en mi cabeza (Vuurwerk in mijn hoofd) in schools and cultural events such as the Fiesta del Libro y la Cultura, the Medellín Book and Culture festival. All in all, thousands of young students were inspired by Colastica's experiences as an author.

With this project the Dutch Embassy in Bogotá helped promoting the culture of Curaçao in Colombia, enhancing the bilateral relations between the two neighbouring countries. (2019)

Melaka - Malaysia

Melaka Classics

The Dutch Embassy in Kuala Lumpur supported the Melaka Classics Festival, with early music as its central theme. Melaka is a former trade post with Dutch cultural heritage, featuring numerous historical locations which were the site of concerts and workshops during the festival.

The Dutch contribution to the festival was a concert in the church on the Stadthuysplein with Dutch baroque music from the 17th century, the time of the Dutch presence in Melaka. Two Dutch musicians, Karlijn Oost and Thomas Triesschijn, performed during this concert, together with Malaysian musicians. They also played in the Ambassador's residence in Kuala Lumpur.

Both events were attended by the Embassy's network. In Melaka itself, this project contributed to intensifying the diplomatic relations with the authorities. (2019)

National Academy for the Visual Arts

The National Academy for the Visual Arts in Amsterdam focuses on developing talent in the fine arts by selecting promising individuals and offering them a platform to further develop their work. The Academy's two-year residency programme includes presentation of the artists' work and the cultivation of an international network. For many alumni the residency has led to their international breakthrough.

Mondriaan Fund

The Mondriaan Fund is the public fund for visual art and cultural heritage in the Netherlands. It facilitates the work of artists, exhibition makers, critics, museums and other art and heritage institutions, and publishers and commissioners. All contributions stimulate the production or presentation of art and heritage from the Netherlands, both at home and abroad, in places where the market does not yet do this. In such contexts, art and heritage can prove to be especially valuable as sanctuaries for the imagination.

Culture Connection aims to bring together different worlds through art projects. Its intention is to create an open space for encounter between people of different cultures and religions, while respecting everyone's own values. Culture Connection creates platforms for cultural exchange and artistic encounters by organising festivals, community arts programmes and dialogue within Europe and cultural collaboration programmes with Mediterranean countries.

Pakhuis de Zwijger, which opened its doors in 2006, is a unique cultural organisation which has grown to be an independent platform dedicated to the city of Amsterdam and its inhabitants. It functions as a 21st-century debate centre, which puts dialogue ahead of conflict and connection ahead of opposition. It encourages collaboration on how to make a liveable city and puts urgent issues on the agenda, linking them to the creative industry.

Monira Al Qadiri's four-sided video installation DIVER showcases swimmers performing synchronised routines similar to the repetitive movements of the pearl diver. The soundtrack of Kuwaiti pearling songs pays homage to the artist's grandfather, who was a singer on a pearling ship; boats were assigned a singer to boost morale in this notoriously dangerous occupation. During the 20th century, the economy of the Arabian Gulf went from the age-old decorative pearls trade to the exploitation of oil. This change had massive impact on society. With the loss of pearling traditions, these songs — some dating back 800 years — are now only played in tourist centres or found in anthropological recordings. By following the movements of synchronized swimmers wearing suits reminding the sheen of both pearls and oil, Monira Al Qadiri raises the attention to a part of history that seems to have been erased.

Centring its research around food history, agriculture and the social and political ties to what constitutes a food culture, the Soft Protest Digest collective aims to design environmentally resilient diets. Since the fall of 2018 onwards, the Nederland edition of The soft Protest digest has been focussing on the eating customs of North Holland. How is it that a country such as the Netherlands appears to be left with a non-flourishing food culture while possessing a thriving food industry (i.e expansion of vegetal meat replacement and massive drone-driven greenhouse productions)? By meeting with food historians, farmers, cooks and knowledgeable citizens of the North Holland region; by researching the history of the cuisine and agriculture of the Netherlands; by tasting and learning how to cook à la Dutch; The soft Protest digest aims to draw new dietary paths in the Dutch food landscape which would altogether be more culturally rooted then vegan patties and more climate-resilient than the rookworst (the Dutch smoked sausage).

Probably Chelsea is an installation consisting of thirty different possible portraits of whistle-blower Chelsea Manning algorithmically-generated by an analysis of her DNA. Manning, a trans woman and pioneering dissident, sent the artist Dewey-Hagborg cheeks swabs while she was in prison and forbidden from being visited. This work celebrates her release when her sentence was commuted by Barack Obama. It also interrogates notions of identity by showing how many ways one's DNA can be interpreted as data, and how subjective the act of reading DNA really is.





In her films and installations Emma Wolukau-Wanambwa examines differing worldviews in the wake of colonialism in east Africa, 'Promised Lands' is a video work addressing displacement, rights to land and memory throughout Uganda and Kenya by giving voices to erased histories. It features the voices of the artist, her uncle Patrick Wanambwa and Theodor Hertzka, a 19th century Austro-Hungarian economist, who was one of many Europeans who tried to establish a utopian settlement ("Freeland") in East Africa. It also refers to the thousands of European refugees who found sanctuary in Africa during World War II and to the current injustice towards African refugees in Europe. It is a fragmentary work reflecting critically on the contradictions of the colonialist imagination.






